



With The Help Of Hot Water Bottles, Matches And Candles... Loxley Band Played On.

Christmas is a-coming, and as the Christian festival gets nearer, so heightened my desire to try and find, and share with readers, the true story of a strange but essential happening across the Loxley Valley.

There it was staring me in the face, and featured in the current issue of our newsy quarterly magazine, it being the appeal for instrumentalists to join the Junior Band.

What struck me most of all, was that delightful sketch of the young man in the 'blue and white' striped Jersey (Autumn Issue), getting short of breath as he tried in vain to force the metal valves of his cornet to produce sound. Reddened cheeks and the frustration written all over his face.. That picture tells it all.

It also made me recall that, hidden away somewhere among my many Local history note books, there was an account of the difficulties experienced by the band members, many years ago; particularly those who played the larger instruments when it was very cold weather. Hard work it was under normal conditions, but when the icy frosts came with severity, and the snows decided to whiten everything over at Christmas tide, it made playing challenging. During the early New Year there was trouble ahead, because numerous bandsmen told me that, no matter how much a man 'blew', nothing happened. Do you know the reason why? Long-Standing band members told me that the freezing weather had certain effects upon the instruments. It

really was so bitterly cold that the valves on the large instruments (carried by the younger members of the band) frosted up, so we carried a candle in our pockets which was quickly produced and lit and held under the valves before any playing could commence. The result of all of this was that by the time the bandsman returned home, late in the evening, our warn coats were well and truly covered in candle fat. Anticipating these conditions and the ritual which had to be followed, the players of the larger instruments managed to 'borrow' a domestic hot water bottle, which they suitably knotted-up to be placed under the valves. Success! During the Christmas period, the band toured various local areas, playing at most of the pubs, at individual houses by invitation, at the 'big' houses (homes of local industrialists where the reception was, refreshmentwise, of plenty of Christmas fayre) and, I gather the seasonal 'tours' extended over some three days. Veteran bandsman, Herbert Marshall, told me that at the end of the three days, the amount collected, or, gifted, was totalled up and so began the 'share-out. Considering a weekly wage in those days was just 17/6d, the addition of a further £2 was very, very welcome indeed, despite the winter's condition to get it.

With large families and money earmarked for very simple presents, to recoup something was a great relief. Membership of the band of six months or less meant just a half share.

I have stacks and stacks of notes about the band and these were collected over many years with the object of producing a mini history, but that challenge awaits me.

Rivelin Valley Conservation Group is this year celebrating 25 Years

säfe

The group was formed in 1991 following a public meeting about the concerns and condition of local overgrown woodlands. From these humble beginnings 25 years ago we have now grown into one of largest Conservation groups in Sheffield with over 500 members whose aims are to promote the protection and maintenance of Rivelin's natural and Industrial heritage along the three miles of the Nature Trail.

The group boasts its own working Task Team made up of 38 local volunteers who work in the valley on a regular basis alongside the council Ranger service to promote these aims. The valley, with its 20 old watermill sites and 21 mill ponds dating from as early as 1580 (Hind Wheel), formed part of



the Industrial Revolution in Sheffield. The importance of these mills cannot be over emphasised, as many were the forerunners of the great metal working industries for which Sheffield became famous.

We have been involved with several projects over the years ranging from Woodland management schemes, public footpath repair and re-building, pond and river monitoring schemes, and the Ponds conservation Trust chose the Rivelin to head its campaign with David Bellamy in attendance.

The group organises monthly programme of open meetings with specialist speakers in attendance and arranges specialty walks e.g. Flora & Fauna, Bat walks, early morning dawn chorus walks. Five editions of the Guide Book "Walking the Rivelin" has brought the industrial history of the Valley and its environmental value to many thousands of Sheffield people. These editions have been researched and prepared by Keith Kendall and Sue Shaw who are members of the Group's Executive Committee. Since 1998 over 4000 of the Guide Books have been sold. A CD was also produced showing the valley as it was in the eyes of Photographer's back in the days when many postcards were produced showing the valley and its mills in all their glory. The RVCG has won many awards over the years including: The Duke of York's Community Initia-

tive Scheme; The Sheffield Telegraph Community award for the Environment; The Sheffield Telegraph Lifetime Achievement Award. In 2007 our retired Chairman received an M.B.E. for his services to Conservation

She answered questions from the floor, and will contact the Ford wedding coach owner, now back, parked either opposite Tesco or on Cairns Rd causing an obstruction. Traffic Division have been asked several times to remove the year-old "Witnessed an Accident" here? sign opposite the Claremont. The graffiti 'artist' who had defaced Tesco and Lydgate Green in September has been dealt with. Steve said the Forum had written to South Yorks Police about how the removal of SNA (safer neighbourhood area) teams had seen an increase in anti social behaviour and there appears to be general agreement with this, so we might see them reformed.

AMEY STREETS AHEAD REPORT—Claire Tideswell said a lot of the major work round Crosspool has been completed - kerb work started and lights finished on the Manchester Road. The paving work is starting out near Moscar and moving inwards toward the city – so should reach the houses on the edge of Crosspool early December; the highway will not be resurfaced until June '17. There are a few trees still to be planted, and some flooding issues on finished roads to be rectified. Instructions are awaited about Rustlings Rd pavement and tree work. Claire answered questions about pavements which collect puddles "please send in photos" and will get Vernon Delph junction "failed carriageway" inspected. The deep gouges at the junction of Hagg Hill and Rivelin Valley Rd will be looked at, and maintenance teams have processes in place with regard to fallen leaf collection. She recognized that the ginnel from Burntstones Cl to Burnstones Dr "has been highlighted" before. There will be a local Roadshow in November, look out for details.

<u>CROOKES CEMETERY</u>—Sue Nadin (Sheffield City Council Bereavement Services) spoke about the poor condition and health hazard that the Chapel had become, so regrettably had to be closed in 2012. However a new bench is on order, Commonwealth War Graves sign re-erected, and a new general notice will be displayed once costed. She has a "massive task" with just 8 employees on her team to cover her area, so if anyone wished to start a "Friends of..." scheme to

apply for funding for the cemetery she would support this. The chapel is Grade II listed & would need £250-£300k to be spent before it could re-open.

FIRST BUS REPORT—Andy Metcalfe sent his apologies and a report to be read out. No changes to the 51 are in the pipeline. The University roundabout, Charter Row and Moor development changes might mean knock-on delays.

said they now had a very limited budget (£2m p.a. – once £5m) and speed bumps are very expensive to install. This street did not score highly from past data of accidents, but the Council is committed to making such streets 20mph zones in the next 4-5 years. Cllr Murphy wanted to ensure this is prioritized, as Crosspool has a very high number of children using the streets.

2/ Weston Park Hospital; George was asked whether the tiny isolated stretch of cycle path by the car park entrance could be removed to ease queuing – on at least one occasion this stretched back to the roundabout - as half those caught in the tailback did not know it was a hospital queue! 3/ Precinct CCTV; Cllr Murphy has a meeting planned for the 28th Oct with Andrew Williams and hopes to get one installed for Crosspool..

4/ The Plough Pub? Cllr Gamble is working with the campaign group on this – there is a Council planning meeting on 22nd Nov.

5/ Rivelin Flood Prevention Scheme: The government is giving Sheffield CC a great deal of money towards the project, the first consultation ends on 31st Oct. There have been a lot of response to the online questionnaire, and Cllr Hanrahan said people have "legitimate concerns" which need to be "solved at the early stage of the planning process".

6/ Darwin Lane water leak? Cllr Murphy said this was a broken clean water pipe, and was the householders' responsibility. However, "as it will cause Darwin Lane to be a skating rink if it freezes" Environmental Health will also be involved if this is not sorted out within a certain time.

7/ A replacement for the car-damaged planter outside the Crosspool Tavern was requested, and litter bins for the public area outside Hallam Football ground.
