The Plough Saved from Demolition

At a meeting of the Planning Committee on August 4th an application from local property developers to demolish the Plough was refused. Despite planning officers recommending demolition, the Planning Committee rejected their report on the Chair's casting vote.

Members of the Planning Committee had been deadlocked with five votes in favour of demolition and five votes against.

Prior to the application going forward to the Committee, the council had received over 210 objections with only 7 supporting the plan for the pub to be replaced by eight executive houses.

The planning committee took place online due to current Covid 19 guidelines. Although members of the public could watch but not participate in the proceedings, two members of the local community were allowed to speak to members of the committee.

Councillor Anne Murphy told the committee that the Plough was 'indisputably' linked to the history of football and that it's loss would be a 'tragedy for Sheffield and for sport' Councillor Murphy said the other cities would be looking to bring the pub back to life and promote it as an asset to the city and not 'tear it apart' *Continued on page 3*

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Continued > Peter Duff from the Save the Plough campaign pointed out that on three occasions in the last five years, the city council had acknowledged the importance of the Plough to the local community. The pub was re-listed as an Asset of Community Value in 2018 following the rejection of Sainsbury's application to convert the Plough into a convenience store in 2017.

Mr. Duff also criticised officers for saying that the applicant had made 'reasonable endeavours' to market the pub at an annual rent of £50,000. Officers had stated that the £50,000 rental value was 'realistic' when compared to other similar properties. However, Mr. Duff said the officer's report was inconsistent. On the one hand, it stated that £50,000 was a realistic rent but, on the other hand, the report said that the majority of other pubs on the market were available for 'significantly less' than £50,000.

After the meeting, Sheffield Hallam MP, Olivia Blake, said that she was 'so pleased that the Plough had been saved from demolition' Ms. Blake had sent a letter of objection to the Planning Committee prior to its meeting and after the decision, she added, 'I hope that the owner will be willing to get around the table and discuss how we can restore this historic pub to its community' Members of the Save the Plough group are now calling on local residents to join their campaign to develop a community based plan for the future development of the site.

High Speed Cables in Crosspool

Virgin Media continues with their expansion of a digital infrastructure and services into the Crosspool area

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Epidemics Part 2 - Smallpox, TB and Flu...

1848 - Sheffield Poor-Law Guardians urged vaccination against smallpox - then 'prevalent in several parts of the town and neighbourhood'.

Among the most vulnerable was young Charlotte Cooper, her family destitute, admitted to Kelham Street Workhouse that winter, unable even to enjoy their best meal - refusing Christmas plum-pudding betrayed early symptoms - and she and her younger sister spent their last days in the Workhouse hospital; both diagnosed with smallpox.

Their father Benjamin Cooper, tending stationary steam engines, had no work: steam power was increasingly on the move, as local inventor John Shaw would demonstrate with his walking metal man (all self-regulating mechanisms and no strings; unlike the Poor-Law system, which locals dubbed a 'puppet piece of machinery' with strings pulled from London).

1849 - JA Roebuck spoke in Paradise Square at his nomination for MP, defending that system, and claiming influence over the Poor Law Board.

'How is the poor man to get it?' came a shout from the crowd - Roebuck turned to face the bereaved Benjamin Cooper, berating him over Poor Law injustices - the only 'heckler' for whom he had none of his usual quickfire answers...

1868 - Brass-turner and optician John Shaw develops a Steam Man - driven by 'inner fires') relatable, thought many Sheffielders?) and impervious to disease.

1882 - His wife Jane Shaw survives him to become a noted muffin-baker of Scotland Street, no doubt (with the Steam Man's help) supplying Edward Carpenter's 1887 cafe on the same street: 'we gave teas to the slum-children who dwelt in the neighbouring crofts and alleys'.

1887 - Winter Street hospital was overwhelmed with smallpox cases - causing some distress among the neighbours. At an outdoor meeting it was pointed out 'the hospital had been put in a locality where the people were poor, and could not engage in law-suits to defend themselves', whereas:

If such a hospital were put up at Ranmoor...there would soon be twenty injunctions out by the Ranmoor property-owners against its use.

Dr John Staniforth, just qualified, officiated at a (makeshift) hospital: a glass pavilion - a former 'dancing saloon and theatre of varieties' - in a Totley pleasure-ground. In a brief lull before the storm he had time to write stories (he would become Maxwell Scott, detective novelist), but smallpox numbers escalated again, his health faltered and he left for the seaside.

1888 - George Bradbury of Wellington Street blamed this new 'Plague' on muffin-bakers for the 'impiety' of supplying wares on a Sunday. A good job Jane Shaw's Steam Man could give untiring (and unholy) assistance - even on days of rest!

1888 - Thomas Garbutt, of the Attercliffe Turkish Baths:

guarantees to CURE, by his Scientific Bathing and Treatment, all cases of SMALL-POX. No Cure, No Pay!

1888 - A wooden-built Lodge Moor Hospital opened at '950 feet above the level of the sea', caring for hundreds of smallpox cases in its first 6 months. The Town Council banned library-book lending and Excursion Trains.

1891 - Horatio Bright's son Sam succumbed to consumption (TB) at Lydgate Hall. Yes, Crosspool had its own characters - and its own tragedies from infectious disease. Just 3 months

earlier a fatal influenza struck Horatio's wife Mary Alice, followed one day later by their cook, Miss Sabra Booth from Barnsley. The grief-stricken Horatio had Mary Alice placed in a glass-panelled coffin at Moscar, where he also installed an organ to play her musical tributes. Did the Steam Man help out with steam-whistle accompaniments?

How to use a face cover safely

With residents now required to wear face coverings in shops, supermarkets and when using public transport, it is important that you understand how to dispose of your face coverings correctly during the coronavirus pandemic in order to maintain public safety.

We recommend the use of reusable face masks as these can be washed, and then reused to prevent and reduce waste. If you use disposable face coverings, they should be thrown away after each use, or as soon as they are damp.

If you need to dispose of your face covering, and no one in your household is self-isolating or showing symptoms of the coronavirus, please follow the following guidance:

- •Place them in your black bin if at home, or a litter bin if you are outside.
- •You do **not** need to put them in an extra bag, and you do **not** need to store them for a time before throwing them away.
- •Do not put them in a recycling bin as they cannot be recycled in your blue or brown bins. If you or a member of your household is showing symptoms and self-isolating, you should continue to use your black bin collection service as normal, with the following important exceptions:
- •Store your personal waste including used face coverings, tissues and disposable cleaning cloths securely within disposable rubbish bags.
- Place each bag into another bag, tie them securely and keep separate from other waste.
- •These bags should be put aside for at least 72 hours before being put in your black bin for collection.

Please **do not** take this waste to your local Household Waste Recycling Centre.

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Crosspool Community Hub

The Hub was set up in March at St Columba's Church office, in conjunction with Voluntary Action Sheffield and the City Council in March, operating from the first Monday of lockdown. The Hub has been staffed 6 mornings per week by a rota of 12 volunteers supported by approximately 20 more who signed up to be available to help those in Crosspool and surrounding areas with issues arising from Lockdown. Out of those hours, the answerphone has been available 24/7 and we have been able to respond to messages generally on a same day, or latest next day basis.

A majority of the demand has been for shopping done for those shielding and self-isolating, as well as collecting prescriptions and we have been working with local shops to arrange and publicise home delivery solutions. We have also been available simply to chat over the phone to those struggling with the issues of this unprece-

Firstly, we need to thank all the volunteers involved, who have been available reliably for the whole time, and The Crosspool Forum who have been extremely supportive. Secondly, we must comment that the anticipated needs in our area were nothing like as great as were possibly anticipated, almost certainly due to the community

We will continue to be available to help with whatever coming out of lockdown brings, and we are still here to help for the foreseeable future. However physically staffing the office six mornings per week seems unjustifiable, so currently the answerphone will be always on and will be checked twice daily at least and there will be staff in the office at times, so please continue to ring and we will get back to you.

KEEPING CROSSPOOL TIDY

To help ensure that our neighbourhood remains healthy and clean, volunteer Crosspool Community Litter Pickers, encouraged by the Sheffield council had, until the governments March lock down/social distancing directive, regularly come together in the Crosspool Shopping Precinct on the first Saturday in the month, to remove discarded waste from our streets and open spaces.

As no community litter picks could take place between April and July one local volunteer Litter Picker went that extra mile, singularly collecting 40 large bags of litter for disposal by the Sheffield cleansing department. Among the knoll of rubbish collected from local streets and school fields, shrubberies and undergrowth; were bottles, sweet and crisp packets, broken tennis rackets and umbrellas, discarded school clothing, asthma inhalers, dozens of tennis and golf balls and disappointingly only 17p in coins (which was donated to charity). We can only hope that in the interest of everyone's health and welfare, this volunteer's tremendous efforts were not in vain and our local neighbourhood and school grounds remain waste and litter free.

Now that the lockdown is easing, a limited socially distanced/sterile litter pick took place on the $1^{\rm st}$ August, the planned September date will be by invitation only and the first official one will be the first Saturday in October, then hopefully every first Saturday in the month throughout the autumn and winter

Everyone is still urged to recycle as much of their household rubbish, waste and unwanted items as they possibly can through their general weekly household waste and recycling bins.

When out and about in the community "take pride in your community" please do not drop litter. Make use of the new dual type rubbish/recycling bins that are popping up all over Crosspool, Veolia do empty these public bins on a regular basis. If you come across any public bins that are full or damaged or you see any fly tipping then please report it immediately on 0114 2734567. Following on from Lydgate Junior Schools "2019" campaign to reduce the use of single use plastic in their school, their homes, in the local community and in their city. most environmentally friendly way.





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
2020 Crosspool Scarecrow Competition Winners

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Eat out Locally

The Eat Out to Help Out 50% discount Scheme ends Monday 31st August 2020.

Under the Eat Out to Help Out Scheme, every Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, 31st August the government will pay 50% of the bill, up to £10 per head, on any meals and soft drinks at any participating pub, restaurant or café.



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Broomhill Temporary Changes to Roads and Foot-ways

To enable pedestrians to maintain the correct social distance between themselves and others, the council have temporary made changes to the road and footway layout on Fulwood Road and Glossop Road in Broomhill. This is to provide additional space on the pavement for pedestrians as they access local amenities.

The parking bays outside the shops have also been temporarily suspended and pedestrianised to allow more space for people to maintain social distancing. The area will remain open for two disabled parking bays, with the addition of two further disabled bays on Spooner Road and Taptonville Road.

Alternative parking is available very close by. This includes the car park above the shops/businesses on Fulwood Road (accessed via Spooner Road) and in Spooner Road Car Park.

The footways on Glossop Road, between Fulwood Road and Peel Street and between Peel Street and the end of the pavement opposite Westbourne Road, will have been temporarily extended by 1.5metres to give additional footway space.



After being closed for more than four months, the Broomhill Community Library at 10 Taptonville Road, reopened on Tuesday 4th August for an order and collect service from the library porch. There is no public access to the library for now please wear a face covering and follow the one-way instructions for entering and exiting
