#### Last Orders?

Despite being saved from demolition last year, The Plough Inn, Crosspool is once again at risk At the time of writing we await The Planning Inspectorate's appeal decision.

Last August, the plough received a stay of execution when the developer's proposal to bulldoze this building of historic value and replace it with eight apartments and car parking, was rejected by the Sheffield City Council's Planning Board.

Now the fate of this historic Sheffield pub, part of the next generations heritage, is under threat once again after Space-pad Construction lodged an appeal against the Sheffield City Council's decision.



The Plough Inn, which has historic ties to Hallam FC, where it's believed the game's modern 'Sheffield Rules' were partly drafted on its premises, called last orders in 2015 and in 2017 the 19th century building was designated a 'Community Asset' by the council.

In the year since Spacepad's proposal was rejected, the Plough's leasehold was listed by consultants Crosthwaite Commercial to be reopened as a pub for £50,000 a year in rent. Peter said: £50,000 a year is way above the rent for comparable pubs, especially when you throw into the mix how it needs significant work to bring it up to working again. "I think they set it that high so when they appealed they could say 'well no one offered to rent it in the past year".

"Knocking down The Plough Inn would mean losing a lovely building with a connection to Sheffield's heritage. It would be another lost opportunity to promote the city as the home of football."

All the representations on the applications made to Sheffield city council to determine this appeal, Reference: APP/J4423/W/21/3267944, will be forwarded for consideration to the Planning Inspectorate (30 Temple Quay House 2 The Square Bristol BS1 6PN) and the appellant, Spacepad Construction Ltd.

#### **Success in the RSC Chemistry Olympiad**

The RSC Chemistry Olympiad is an annual competition organised by the Royal Society of Chemistry. It is targeted at the most able chemistry students in Year 13, nationally, and comprises two rounds.

The first round was a lengthy and challenging written chemistry examination. Students completed the written exam at home, scrutinised over Google Classroom. King Edward's had six students who volunteered for the Olympiad. These students were, Anna, Jacob, Kian, Matthew, David and James. Pleasingly, all entrants achieved a certificated award for their performance which was Bronze, Silver or Gold. Matthew and Kian achieved Gold. This represents an astounding achievement and placed these two students very highly, in the UK. Kian Moshiri's score was so high that it led to him being invited to the second round. Only around thirty students nationally get the invite. Looking at the scores of the other students that made the second round, Kian was placed very highly, even within this elite group.

The second round was used to decide which students would go on to represent the UK in Japan, later this year. The second round took place over a weekend. It included two bespoke lectures on very high-level chemistry and a four-hour exam. Students were also expected to read and understand two chapters from an undergraduate chemistry textbook. One of the chapters involved some difficult quantum mechanics! The level of the chemistry would genuinely challenge many undergraduates.

Having spent quite a lot of time with Kian, helping him to prepare, I can say that his ability in chemistry is exceptional. In twenty-five years of teaching chemistry at the School, I dare say that Kian is the most talented chemist that I have had the pleasure of working with. Sadly, he didn't make the national team of four students. Participants did not find out their score; only whether they were selected, or not. It is worth mentioning that Kian was also preparing for Grade 8 Piano and Flute, as well as his other A-Levels.

Kian has been offered a place at Trinity College, Cambridge to study Mathematics. He has told me that he may select some chemistry options at Cambridge, so that he can 'keep his hand in'. Mr William Davey, Chemistry Department.


#### A Rose by Any Other Name

#### Teenage Boy 'seriously injured'

Emergency services were called to the incident on Manchester Road at 4.50pm Thursday, 10<sup>th</sup> June. Crosspool resident Joe Graham (Taekwondo instructor) helped other passers- by to stop and direct traffic after a 16-year-old boy was seriously injured when crossing the Manchester Road near to the Tesco store He was taken to hospital by ambulance but his injuries are not believed to be life threatening.

This accident prompted Jo to start a campaign for road safety measures to be implemented on the roads of Crosspool. Jo is asking residents to sign her petition which she intends to present to the council.

Cllr. Mohammed Mahroof agrees that there is a problem and safer crossing points are urgently needed in Crosspool. Saying that, "there is a constant stream of traffic on Manchester Road, some difficult junctions plus lots of young children at Lydgate Juniors, Lydgate Infants and Ryegate Children's Centre". He went on to say "There has been a lot of concern around Crosspool regarding safe crossing points and traffic in general. The areas of particular concerns are Manchester Road outside Tesco, Lydgate Lane and Cross Lane to name but a few. Council officers need to accompany me on a walk around these particular locations and to allocate a budget to address this issue of public safety".

Cllr. Douglas Johnson, Cabinet member for transport, said: "There are a lot of such requests and the budget does not allow us to address all of them."

He added that there were existing pedestrian crossings along Manchester Road to schools in the area, although these may not provide the most direct route for all students and residents.

"I'm sure you will appreciate the council receives many requests for road safety measures and crossings from residents. "Ideally, we would like to be able to respond to most of them. However, the budget for highway improvements is extremely limited which means that only a small number of schemes can be built each year.

"The limitations on our resources mean that we have to assess and prioritise locations for measures according to certain criteria, which includes for example how difficult the road is to cross, traffic speeds, and how many pedestrians use the route. "One of the most important of these relates to the prevention of accidents, particularly those recorded as serious or fatal.

"Although we cannot know where the next accident may occur, it is more likely to happen at a location having a history of previous accidents than one with few or none. "In this way we can focus on locations where measures are most urgently needed.

"The criteria we use to assess crossing requests include the pedestrian accident history; the degree of fear and intimidation, as well as how much any improvement would assist access to any local amenities or centres."

"The council followed Department for Transport guidance and officers assessed new requests on a quarterly basis.

#### Hallam FC Open Sky Sports Bar

Hallam FC open Sky Sports Bar heralding new chapter in this famous club's history.

When Hallam FC played the very first recognised competitive game of football against local rivals Sheffield FC back in 1860, who could have foretold how the game of football would grow, blossom, and become the passion of vast swathes of the globe? Certainly the founder of Hallam FC, a certain J. C. Shaw of Manchester Road in Crosspool, would, no doubt, be dumbstruck to learn how that fateful game between the Countrymen (Hallam FC's famous nickname) and Sheffield FC would go on to inspire such things as the FIFA World Cup, the Premier League, and Sky Sports. He might also be a little indignant that those new kids on the block, Sheffield United and



Sheffield Wednesday, have gone on to grab Sheffield's footballing limelight!

Hallam FC's historic ground at Sandygate continues to be a place with deep roots in the game and a place of cultural significance. It is officially the oldest football ground in the world, and attracts visitors from around the globe who wish to soak up the atmosphere and explore the history behind the place that has every right to call itself the cradle of modern football.

It is entirely appropriate then that Hallam FC, while being rightly proud of its heritage, should also embrace the modern era. To this end, on Saturday 7<sup>th</sup> August, it was a happy moment, and another chapter in Hallam's illustrious history, when Hallam FC's Sky Sports Bar was opened.

Hallam FC's clubhouse bar has long been a focal point of the local community, and during the Covid lockdown restrictions, it was opened as an outdoor venue to help service and lift the spirits (as it were) of the local community. With the introduction of the Sky Sports Bar, Hallam FC hope to reaffirm their commitment to grass roots football and the local community. It was fitting that on the opening day, Hallam FC's Sky Sports Bar broadcast football matches from those previously mentioned new kids on the block, Sheffield Wednesday and Sheffield United!

It is also appropriate that the bar served a beer brewed by the local Crosspool Ale Makers Society and named after Hallam FC founder J. C. Shaw. Brewed on Manchester Road, in the very same location that Mr Shaw himself lived in until the late 1890s, this beer was a huge hit with the Sky Sports Bar customers, and proved that while football may have grown into a

- Walk down Manchester Road on the pavement going out of town, you will see Valleyside Garden Centre on your left and the Rivelin Valley opening out in front of you. About a quarter of a mile past Valleyside, take the footpath to the right down the fields to the river. Go through the small gate, cross the green bridge and turn left onto Rivelin Valley Nature Trail.
- Proceed up the steps to the pond and "Woolf Wheel", cross the little sluice gate, and at the millstone keep straight on.
- "Frank Wheel" is the next historic point on your right. Crossing the bridge next to the waterfall go up some steps and follow the path between the river and the conduit
- After crossing a narrow stone path, the path continues along the bottom side of an open field and then turns up a hill, after the stone gateposts bear off to the left down some steps. There is a pond at the bottom and the next historic point "Second Coppice Wheel" and the "Upper Coppice Wheel" - the place for wild swimming!
- The path continues along the side of the river until you reach the pack horse bridge. Go over the bridge and turn immediately left onto a wide path up to Manchester Road (about 400 metres).
- Cross the road to go through the farm gateway the footpath is immediately to the left after the gatepost, then after 10 metres turn right up the path to the bicycle hop and into the woods (this is point "X" - see directions for shorter walk below). Look out for tea and cake at the Apple Shack on the right after the hop (open Friday to Sunday -@theappleshack on Instagram).
- Follow the path up the woods (about 500 metres) to some stone steps and after that bear left to stepping stones over the water at Black Brook
- the path then takes you along the crags and the edge of the golf course for about a mile, eventually coming out on Coppice Lane (the Byway which runs into Moorbank Road). Walk along Moorbank Road and turn left down Coldwell Lane - you are then back onto Manchester
- Road into Crosspool. • This walk is about four miles long and takes about 1.5 hours. If you would prefer a shorter walk (just under an hour), start on Moorbank Road and walk down Coppice Lane (the byway) to Manchester Road. Just before you get onto the main road turn left into the bridle-
