CROSSPOOL PERSON OF THE YEAR

Brenda Nelson, from being a nurse at the Manchester Rd Surgery to taking on the task of church warden at St Columba's church in March 2020, started a community hub for vulnerable local people to help with their shopping etc., this became the Crosspool vaccination hub in October.

Working with six local GP practices from Stannington to Walkley, Broomhill to Lodge Moor they discussed how to operate safely in a time of great fear. Many of the over 80s had not been outside for months and were very nervous at meeting others. St Columba's Church was closed and all kneelers, prayer books, noticeboards and many chairs had to be removed, to make way for clinical fridges and IT equipment. On 9th Jan 2021 thirty volunteers started to help, all with PPE, &

accepting the high risks involved and two WhatsApp groups came on board. (at the time the death rate went up from 1156 to 1666) - but how many people would attend? Then it snowed!!, so a second group had to be enrolled to clear snow and grit the pavements, and help with parking at the Tavern. Despite all the windows and doors being open for good ventilation people did turn up to be vaccinated. (One person even walked all the way from Stannington) After a day when the snow prevented 100 people arriving for their appointments, and determined not to lose one dose of their 1200 doses, they stayed open until late at night, the next day they were inundated! (Over the succeeding months the death rate went down to 30 a day - but we are slowly winning!). Many funny stories were shared among them and the hub become so comfortable and welcoming to attendees that they outstay the recommended 15 minutes waiting time (Pfizer vaccine) to sit and chat! The Labour léader, Sir Keir Starmer visited the hub accompanied by an entourage of the press and photographers from local and national TV/Papers.

People and local shops have been bringing in chips, pizzas, cakes and goodies. - "such a wonderful response" said Brenda. There might be lots of chairs to clean all the time and floors to sanitize but she feels privileged to share peoples' stories at this odd time. Over the past ten months they have had a total of sixty five volunteers, with another two just about to start. It has become" a family", university students, early retirees and couples doing a couple of hours to whole shifts.....with there even being a romance being sparked between a couple of volunteers!

Some forty thousand people have been vaccinated, with fifteen thousand more vaccinations to give. Brenda felt she was just in the right place at the right time and thanked church leaders and doctors' practices for their collaboration, cooperation and help.

For her hard work, dedication and commitment to the community, Brenda has been presented with an engraved goblet and the CROSSPOOL PERSON OF THE YEAR AWARD certificate.



CHAIRMAN'S ANNUAL REPORT

Brenda gave a thoroughly interesting short presentation of the work still being done there.

.COUNCILLORS' QUESTIONS

1/ Cllr Mohammed Mahrouf spoke about the road safety issues at Crosspool and how much difficulty he is having in getting funding to change anything. The dangers the Stephen Hill/ Manchester Rd/Benty Lane junction posed; the Tesco car park entrance and both-sides parking on some already-narrow residential roads was mentioned.

2/ The brand-new LACS (Local Area Committees) had their first public meeting in September, Our councillors Mohammed, Ruth Milsom & 2 Forum committee members attended, (apologies from Cllr.Tim Huggan). It is to be hoped we can 'tap into' some good funding from LACS once they are properly up & running.

3/The Council has lost 50% of its funding over the last few years - & Ruth accepted that when there is a budget overspend (as now) some S10 & S11 projects are the ones to be cut first.

4/The Rivelin Valley has had a problem for over a year with the Hind Wheel pond leak – Mohammed was asked to put pressure on the Council to get this fixed.

5/Tree Pruning, apparently STAG together with StreetsAhead has to inspect any tree before major work is done now.

KING EDWARDS VII SCHOOL

Schools' Climate Education





South Yorkshire

Awareness of the climate change, its impacts and the need for change are issues that many young people are aware of and some quite informed. King Edward VII School has an active Eco-School

Committee, made up of young people across all three key stages, from both Lower and Upper School sites. Schools' Climate Education South Yorkshire (SCESY) is a small organisation of educationalists across a number of primary and secondary schools, primarily in Sheffield. Mark Lallemand, one of the Teachers in the English Department at King Edward VII School is a member of the organizing committee. SCESY's aim is to support schools, teachers and students on their climate education journey.

This ranges from the specifics of reducing carbon emissions as a school to promoting active citizenship in relation to the climate and ecological emergency, encouraging respect and understanding for the environment from school, to home, nationally and internationally.

This is now a significant part of the agenda of King Edward VII School, which has explicit objectives written into the School Improvement Plan, referring directly to aspects such as carbon footprint auditing and assessing the carbon footprint of goods and services bought in by the School.

From 5th to 7th July SCESY put on its first virtual online conference for schools in South Yorkshire. Forty primary and secondary schools signed up and King Edward VII was one of the first schools to sign up, through Eco-School staff leads, Mr Johnston, from the Geography Department, and Mrs Bishop, from the non-teaching staff.



The conference was due to be held last year and hosted by Sheffield Hallam University but because of the pandemic had be postponed. It has not been possible to host a face to face conference this year, so everything has moved online. Students in Years 7, 8 and 9 engaged in assemblies about the conference, took part in a competition to invent a new climate related word for a future dictionary, and took part in online workshops from the comfort of their Science, Maths,

Geography, PSHE and Food Technology lessons.

The conference was opened by Dame Sarah Storey, winner of 14 Paralympian Gold Medals, and Active Travel Commissioner for Sheffield City Region. Some of the stand-out workshops that were planned:



Students created their own wind turbines and discussed ways to supply power to our cities of the future in a more sustainable way. Students explored practical ways in which our own School grounds can be made more environmentally and nature friendly.

BOSH! are two chefs from Sheffield who met at school and have teamed up to create fun, tasty and awesome plant-based food that even the most committed carnivore will love! They held a live cooking workshop which got those taste buds going!



Hope for the Future worked with students on how they can effectively engage their MPs in coming up with policies that will have an impact on the way the UK moves towards a zero carbon future. They finished with a live workshop with Sheffield Hallam MP Olivia Blake, and students were able to ask her questions about her life in politics and how we can tackle climate change issues as a School and as a country.

This workshop, run by the Centre for Alternative Technology in Wales, gave students the chance to examine the data in relation to carbon emissions, explored how the UK can move towards a zero carbon future, encouraged students to envisage a positive sustainable and just future world, where noone is left behind in the move towards a low carbon economy.

So, what were some of the outcomes from this conference for King Edward VII School? Maybe students will lead the School in looking at some of the following:

- How the food we offer can be even more local, sustainably sourced and packaged.
- How the energy we use as a School can be reduced even further.
- How the School can explore more sustainable and renewable energy supplies, such as ground source heating and solar panels.
- How the School can promote even more sustainable ways of getting to and from School for staff and students.
- How our School grounds can be increasingly transformed into a nature friendly, litter free environment. Watch this space!

Excellent news! Lower School site members of the Eco-Committee took part in the final panel event and selected questions to go forward to the COP26 meeting of world leaders in Glasgow in November.

Museums Sheffield Curatorial Project

A Level Fine Art and Photography students from King Edward VII will be curating an exhibition in School showcasing carefully selected works from Sheffield's extensive visual art collection; inspiring young people to understand and value art.

A small group of students will spend an afternoon with acclaimed artist Keith Piper as he curates his upcoming exhibition at The Graves Art Gallery in Sheffield. A unique opportunity to asks questions about curation, context and visual narrative.



Artist / Teacher Stephen Carley and Sheffield Museum's curator Kirstie Hamilton will coordinate this exciting pilot project using the unique space of King Edward VII Upper

School on Glossop Road as an alternative exhibition venue bringing original works of art into the heart of an education establishment.

To guote from a recent letter from Museums Sheffield:

"The project will allocate funding to support a project that will create tangible ways for people to engage with the Museums and Galleries collection in their formative years and explore how we can help young people to become more familiar with their collection and harness its potential as a resource for learning, inspiration and creativity.

We would like to work with you, your colleagues and a group of students from King Edward VII School to create a series of exhibitions curated with, by and for young people that will be displayed off site. The project will work towards the outcome of deepening young people's learning experiences and developing their understanding of, and relationship with, the collection they own. Central to this work will be the display of works from the collection in School in

2022 and then beyond this, potentially there will be a further three years of activity. The project will be approached and realised with the utmost professionalism broadening the knowledge and understanding of the participants as well as giving them insight into working in a cultural organisation. Beyond those immediately involved, the exhibitions will also engage with the wider cohort of young people



studying at the School and there is the potential for other subject areas to become involved".



Community Support Worker

Aquabox

Aquabox is a charity organised by the Rotary Club of Wirksworth and has been supported by the congregation of Stephen Hill Methodist Church for many years. When catastrophe hits the population of a poor region of the world, be it a hurricane, tsunami, flood or earthquake, there is an immediate need for clean water. It is possible to live for many days without food but clean water is an immediate need. There may be plenty of water available but it is essential that water for drinking is free of pollutants. This is where Aquabox comes in. The box is capable of holding found water and it is provided with filter which can remove almost all the impurities. Also included in the box are useful items for getting life restarted, hammers, nails, tarpaulins, cooking pots, and so on – even a soft toy for the children. The filters are made by volunteers in a warehouse in the Derbyshire hills. More volunteers pack all the additional items ready for despatch. In fact the whole operation is managed by volunteers, apart from an administrator who works a 20 hour week. There are no plush London offices, itis all controlled from the Derbyshire HO.

Aquaboxes have recently been sent to Haiti, Nepal, Yemen, Gaza, Syria and Senegal in each case they have been received by trusted partner organisations (often Rotary Clubs) for distribution where the need is greatest.

Since Stephen Hill started its support well over 120 boxes have been bought and filled by people using the church. Details of the charity and a list of items needed for the boxes are available on the noticeboard in the church forum. Contributions of cash or items of support are always welcome. If you want to talk about how you can help you will usually find Bob and Trevor at the church coffee morning on Mondays.

ST COLUMBA'S VACCINATION CENTRE UPDATE

The church site at St Columba's started vaccinations on January 9th, a collaboration between the church, the local community, the City Council, and the GP practices.

The Church

Stephen Hill and St Columba's church have been operating together as one congregation, under one minister, and were pleased to be able to offer the St Columba's site to meet the community's most urgent need. This has meant overseeing vaccine deliveries and clinical supplies, learning the best ways of organising clinics (by trial and error), and receiving calls from patients when the surgeries have been dealing with an overwhelming volume of enquiries. Brenda Nelson, with her experience as a Practice Nurse, has been invaluable in overseeing the medical supplies, as well as the organising of community volunteers of which we need around 10 per day. The church team have weighed in with practical oversight and support, this in addition to keeping church services and other activities going. This became more complex as the year went on and regular activities re-started, and we have been without a minister since Easter which also adds to the workload, as we arrange routine services as well as baptisms, funerals etc.

We owe a huge debt to the local church communities, not just Stephen Hill and St Columba, but Tapton Congregational church and St Luke's Lodge Moor who have supported and helped in many ways including offering to volunteer with clinics.

sending pizzas, and notably, for a thank you party organised by the lead GP, providing large quantities of food at half price, and throwing in another batch free.

The Council

We have been supported by the City Council's events team who have provided door Stewards for each clinic, and have supported practical needs, such as arranging commercial scale waste bins, grit bin, and visited regularly to check al, is OK. Their sub-contractor, S1 Security, who supply the door stewards have also been a great support.

The Medical Team

The clinics are run by the West 5 Primary Care Network. This network consists of six GP practices which supply 5 vaccinators, 5 administrators and a receptionist each day we hold a clinic, and the staff arrive from 7.30 for an 8pm start and work through to 5pm or later when looking for extra patients to use any vaccines which would otherwise be wasted. The medical team do this whilst sustaining normal working at the surgeries during a time when they have been overwhelmed by extra pressures during the pandemic.

We owe a huge debt to the team's commitment and hard work, and in July, lead GP, Tom McAnea wrote to thank the volunteers, but I think it is an appropriate tribute to all involved...

The Joint Committee on Vaccination and Immunisation (JCVI) estimate that the covid-19 vaccination programme has saved an estimated 10,000 lives. If we extrapolate from those numbers, given our population, this means between 20-30 people in our community are now alive who would otherwise have died. It is that important. Moreover, this does not take account of the many more people who would have become more seriously ill, been admitted to hospital and possibly suffered from 'long covid'. In a time of genuine national crisis, where over 150,000 of our fellow citizens have died you have stepped up and made a difference. You should be incredibly proud of this work and your personal contribution to it.

The first 2 phases of the programme came to an end mid-August, when we had achieved around 38,000 doses given, after which we keenly waited to start Phase 3 (boosters) as various decisions were being made by the powers that be. Following a faltering start in October, we continue with Phase 3 of the vaccination programme from November onwards, working at a similar pace to the first 8 months, with at least another 15,000 doses needed before we finish. As I write this, I know we have now administered 40,000 doses and expect to have achieved well over 50,000 by Christmas.

We hope to have finished the mass vaccination programme, and after some necessary refurbishment, get back to some normality early in the New Year, but it has been a privilege to be involved. Everyone has worked together to make the operation successful, and there is a friendship and camaraderie which is inspirational.
