CROSSPOOL 20 MPH SPEED LIMIT

Sheffield City Council proposes to make an Order under the provisions of Section 84 and Schedule 9 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 to introduce a 20mph speed limit on the whole or on parts of every road in Crosspool and the surrounding area, exceptions being Lydgate Lane, Manchester Road and Sandygate Road from the junction of Ringstead Crescent near to the shopping precinct.

The proposed 20mph speed limit is required to control vehicle speeds in the residen-

tial streets of the Crosspool area.

A copy of the proposed plans showing the roads affected and a statement of the Council's reasons for proposing to make the Order, may be inspected in "Proposed Traffic Orders" on the Council website at :-



Open Meeting-Bullet Points Thurs 27th January 2022

Present: Ian Haque (Chair), Steve Reynolds (Vice chair), Angela Southward, Nick Duggan, Roger Kite, and 19 Crosspool residents

Apologies: - Gillian and John Drinkwater, Cllr Mohamed Mahroof Guests; Linda Gooden (Head teacher KES), Cath Jackson (Assistant Head KES), Steve Ellis (St Columba's church), Cllrs. Ruth Milsom and Tim Huggan

Ian Hague welcomed everyone and introduced the top table. He then introduced Linda Gooden

Head teacher at King Edwards School (KES) and Cath Jackson, Deputy Head

Linda and Cath spoke about the difficulties faced by KES during the pandemic and the reopening of the school. Tribute was paid to staff for their hard work to make sure no student fell behind due to online learning and in adapting to a new way of providing education, also to the excellent support from parents and agencies such as social services to assist with the mammoth task of ensuring that 'students' education and safeguarding continued. Other success areas were liaising with parents, student bubbles and transition arrangements for feeder school students. The school is now fully open and starting to open up sporting and other activities and potential trips. Current issues involve staff and student absence due to Covid and addressing learning gaps due to students not being in school.

In answer to public questions it was stated that future issues could involve students mental health due to anxiety over the pandemic, and that some had struggled but were gradually readiusting to being back in school, issues of long Covid would be monitored and teacher assessments were proving that positive progress was being made.

Ian and Steve thanked Linda and Cath for their continued close work with the Forum and Cross-

pool community.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT The bullet points of the 28th October meeting were agreed as a true record and will be made available on the website.

The Local Area Committee (LAC) was held via zoom recently and there was plenty of discussion around the developing local community plan. Information is on the council website under SWLAC.

Concern was raised regarding the proposed building of 55,000 new homes on greenfield sites in Sheffield but Cllr Tim Huggan described the process whereby about 44, 000 new homes were to be built over 15 years on a hierarchy of sites using brownfield sites first before any greenfield sites.

FINANCIAL REPORT The Forum has a reasonably healthy balance despite the lack of community fundraising events due to the pandemic. Tai chi continues to do well but easy exercise classes can only continue due to a grant from the council to help cover costs. The cost of printing the Clarion magazine has risen by a large amount and so it may be necessary to increase advertising costs to cover it. The Forum is grateful to Archer's estate agents for sponsoring the magazine.

POLICE UPDATE Steve read out the police report which had been sent. Sadly, there have been several incidents – burglaries and attempted burglaries on Lydgate Lane, Sandygate, Den Bank and Coldwell Lane and is often in order to steal vehicle keys to then steal vehicles. People are reminded not to keep keys on show and if possible to keep car keys in protective wallets or a tin box. There has also been an attempted break in at the scout hut so people are asked to be extra vigilant at the moment.

ST COLUMBA'S CHURCH VACCINATION HUB UPDATE Steve Ellis gave a comprehensive review of the vaccination programme at St Columba's church hub, thanks to the hard work of staff and volunteers an amazing 50,000 jabs delivered over the year, including support for people with extra needs such as autism. Many thanks due to all involved including volunteers, local businesses for their support and to the community for putting up with disruption to normal church activities. The clinics have now finished apart from ad hoc ones as necessary. The hall floor will need to be replaced as due to Covid regulations of chlorine bleaching after every session the parauet flooring has become damaged.

PUBLIC TRANSPORT Ian mentioned the Sheffield to Manchester X57 bus service which has

sadly stopped running due to becoming financially unsustainable.

COUNCILLORS' Q&A's Clirs Milsom and Huggan talked about the South West LAC and the proposed community plan, details are on the council website under South West LAC. In response to questions it was stated that as well as new housing, infrastructure and bus routes would be considered. It was felt by planning staff that 40,000 houses would be sustainable by Sheffield but needed to be built on brownfield sites first, and it was stated that at least 5000 would be social housing in addition to the 4000 currently being built. In response to questions regarding Clough Field public footpath, a case is currently being prepared to present to the council rights of way officer. The owner of Clough Fields talked about public damage to his property and fields during lockdown but it was felt that this was a police matter and did not affect the current issue of public right of way.

There are funds available in the ward pot for local groups to apply for projects, contact the

council or local councillors for details.

EVENTS: The 2022 calendar has sold well, only a few copies left at G T News. The Children's Christmas party was enjoyed by everyone, with party food and an entertainer (Barney Baloney) and although Father Christmas could not make it this year each child had a gift to go home with. The Christmas trees looked lovely in the precinct and the tree recycling in early January was a big hit with the community. The Crosspool Summer Festival and Summer Fayre is currently being planned to go ahead as normal, Roger Kite asked the meeting to approve this year's chosen charities which are "Baby Basics" and "The Samaritans". This was approved. Plans

are being made for the Queen's platinum jubilee with ideas such as new flags in the precinct, bunting and red, white and blue flowers in the precinct tubs. Anyone with ideas for activities or wishing to help, please contact either Steve, Ian or a Crosspool Forum committee members.

KING EDWARDS VII SCHOOL

King Edward VII School Students Address Global Leaders at COP26 in Glasgow. Ugandan climate activist, Vanessa Nakate, addressed global leaders at the recent COP26 conference in Glasgow.

Most of us were aware of the COP26 conference of global leaders in Glasdow in the first two weeks of November 2021. The summit of international leaders has

addressed a growing sense of urgency many feel about what many refer to as the climate and ecological emergency.



Young people have played a striking role in raising the profile of issues surrounding the climate emergency, with activists such as Ugandan Vanessa Nakate and Greta Thunberg expressing the

concerns of many young people across the world.

Many students at King Edward VII School are equally engaged in these concerns surrounding the impact of climate change and what can be done to address its causes and mitigate against its further impacts. Students in Year 8 and Year 9 in some English lessons have been exploring some of the issues global leaders have been wrestling with and taking the opportunity to address

leaders by writing letters to them, as part of a creative writing unit linked to writing to express a viewpoint.

Her is one letter by a Y9student, Justin Mclean Dear COP26 Global Leaders,

I am writing because we are in the midst of this ongoing climate crisis and action needs to be taken. As we all know, time is running out and the effects of climate.

change are happening in front of our eyes.

The causes of this are clearly massively due to our human lifestyle: for too long we have been burning fossil fuels without thinking about the consequences for the future. Why have we ignored this for so long? We are already witnessing the result of rising global températures. If we let the temperatures rise again by two degrees celsius in the near future then scientists have predicted that the already occurring extreme weather events will only worsen and increase in frequency. Why should we care? I'll tell you why, it's because we have one global system that we all rely on for our crops and fresh water.

The impacts of climate change can be seen throughout the world. In the arctic, ice caps are melting which affects not only the animals living there but causes global sea levels to rise. This dramatically affects the global weather patterns, furthermore puts many low-lying countries at risk of flooding. Such as many Asian countries including: Japan, China, Bangladesh and Vietnam. Rising sea levels will threaten 200 million people by 2100. In other continents, forest fires are becoming more frequent like in Australia and the Americas. In addition to this, hurricanes are becoming more prevalent.

What I think should be done is we need to take the bold move to step away from burning fossil fuels and move onto renewable energy sources which our planet provides us in abundance. Also areas we can easily make changes in are renewables, plastics and changing our habits like flying. I know some people may disagree about the changes necessary but immediate action must be taken before the planet has tipped beyond the point of return.

Article by Mr Lallemand, English teacher Healthy Hampers: King Edward VII School - Sixth Form Girls supporting Survivors of Human Trafficking in Sheffield.

A group of Sixth Form students, under the competent and enthusiastic leadership of Lola Middleton-Welch, now in Year 13, have been working with the women from SI (Soroptimist International) Sheffield on a project in support of Snowdrop, a charity which helps survivors of Human Trafficking and Modern Day Slavery to set up new lives. The idea for the Healthy

Hampers project came from the workers at Snowdrop itself. They had identified several basic needs for their clients: learning the English language familiarising themselves with the culture of a new

country and, of course, healthy food for themselves and often their children. The Healthy Hampers project supports all these needs. The students designed illustrated recipe cards in simple English which introduce a typical British dish. They also planned and managed fundraising activities to buy the ingredients and helped the Soroptimists pack the boxes with the food items and cooking equipment needed to cook the dish. Several dozen hampers have now been delivered to women in need, helping them feed themselves and their children, learn about British culture and practise their English.



The Snowdrop Clients who have received these Healthy Hampers of food and equipment have been very grateful and enjoyed making meals such as vegetarian casseroles, veggie pasties and shepherd pies. We are very proud of the girls and what they have contributed to the lives of the women who have been trafficked, sold and abused. The Healthy Hamper Scheme has helped these women in being able to build a new life. AQUABOX

AQUABOX is a charity which sends water cleaning filters to disaster areas

IANUARY 2022 UPDATE

The Philippines has been devastated by a typhoon. Aquabox is sending a consignment of water filters to one of the main affected areas, to help some of the 520,000 people in desperate need of clean drinking water.

The typhoon hit the Visayas and Mindanao Islands leaving the population in need of assistance and without access to clean water and sanitation.

It brought torrential rains, violent winds, landslides and storm surges, cut off water services and contaminated reservoirs. There are now long queues at the few open water refilling stations. Power has been down in almost all areas severely impacted by the disaster, affecting the operation of electricity-run water systems.

Aquabox is working with its partners in the Philippines to establish safe and secure distribution routes to the worst hit areas, sending a combination of Family Filters and Community Filters. This shipment will provide clean water to over 7,000 people but it will cost nearly £15,000 (mainly due to the cost of air freight). That's just over £2 per person. Not bad is it?

Aquabox relies entirely on donations and the fundraising activities of its supporters. It is run by volunteers (apart from a part-time depot manager). Members of our two churches have been supporting the charity for some time and have sent a cheque for £150 whilst continuing to raise funds for ongoing support. MASS VACCINATION PROGRAMME DRAWS TO A CLOSE

Firstly, a huge thank you from the team here at St Columba's for your patience, understanding and encouragement during 2020/21 vaccination programme.

We appreciate the inconvenience and frustration these circumstances have caused, but as you have been part of our efforts because of your patient understanding, it is appropriate to share with you recent words from the Clinical Director who has been overall in charge of the operation... "Above all, we did our best for every single one of our patients from the six practices, and those from beyond. This was why we did this work, and in doing so I will remind you all (again) that you saved lives. You also reduced hospital admissions, cases of long covid and other medical complications. At a time of national crisis, you stepped forward and protected our local citizens from what has been a very dangerous virus. I salute your efforts. So thank you!"

We have achieved over 50,000 doses in just less than 100 days of clinics, because of the work and support of so many, including you.

Now the mass vaccination programme is finished, our plans for this year. We may have a couple more 'mop-up' clinics, yet to be arranged, and the Children's Hospital is having a walk-in day during half-term.

We need to refurbish the floors which have been severely damaged by the high footfall and the requirement for sanitising with chlorine after each day's clinic (this requirement has now been shelved). The NHS are funding that refurbishment, and we also have re-decoration of the main worship area to be done prior to the flooring repair. We are using a local, well established firm to deal with all this work which will start on 21st February, with an estimated finish date of 21st March. During this work, we may be able to offer one-off bookings, but regular use will not be realistically possible.

We feel confident in saying that the church will be ready for 'normal' use by April, when we hope to welcome you back. As a regular user prior to the pandemic, we will honour your booking as it was previously, unless you tell us otherwise, Again, a big thank you, and best wishes for all 2022 brings!

MEMORIES OF CROSSPOOL

Hello,

I grew up in Crosspool from 1943 until 1970 and lived on Vernon Delph when I left to live in Burton -upon-Trent where I still live. I wonder if you would be interested in my memories of Crosspool from that period.

Between 1948 -1955 I attended Lydgate Lane School, where John (later Joe) Cocker was in the same class. My teacher was Miss Clements and the Head teacher was Mr. Peck who lived on Marsh Lane. Off Marsh Lane there was a track which led to the cemetery and passed through what was then known as Spook's Wood, is it still known as that?

My father and maternal grandfather used to visit the King's Head (now gone) on a Friday night in the 1950s. They also used to go to watch Hallam FC on Sandygate Road on a Saturday.

My recollections of the shops were as follows but there could be some errors; it was a long time ago! Entering from Manchester Road, on the left was Darwin's fishmongers, Gosney's hairdressers (?) and Mabbut's butchers.

Round the corner was Elliot's fish and chip shop, later Charles double-fronted shop which sold sweets and ?. Next came Gosney's decorators, Austin's butcher, Turner's bakery, Preston's (?) chemists, Gower's grocers and the Provincial bank.

Across the road just above Ringstead Crescent and set back was a hairdresser's. Returning down the road was Crisp's ironmongers and Senior's newsagents Just before Benty Lane was the Co-op store and co-op Butchers onthe corner. Crossing over Benty Lane was the Post Office, Davey's bakery and Brayrooks(?) greengrocers. On the corner of Manchester Road was Ward's cake shop and then Ranson's garage where you could buy 4 gallons of petrol and have change from a pound in around 1963!

Off Lydgate Lane just pass the Crosspool Tavern and set back from the road was Waller's newsagents and tobacconists.

I hope you may find some of this of interest. I have never returned to Crosspool in over fifty years but keep saying I should.
