ANNE MARIE MURPHY

Stand out from the Crowd

We at the Crosspool Forum were deeply saddened to learn of the passing of Anne Marie Murphy, an outstanding councillor, who died on the evening of Friday, December 23rd 2022, after losing her lifelong battle with illness. Anne was 'one of a kind', and will be remembered for her infectious smile and her determination to make both Crosspool and this city she loved, a better place for everyone. Anne was well liked, admired and respected by all councillors across the political spectrum and within the local community by the residents who she served so passionately.

Anne was born in Crookes and lived in the city for the best part of her life. She first became a councillor in 2014, when she was elected to serve the Crookes and Crosspool Ward. Between 2017 and 2018, Anne also served as Lord Mayor, a role which she suited so well. In 2021, Anne became councillor for Manor Castle, allowing her to fight for change for her constituents across a broader area of Sheffield.

Throughout her time in office, Anne continued to live in Crosspool and could be seen around the precinct on a regular basis, helping out at the monthly litter pick and chatting away with local residents during regular visits to the shops. And, of course, She remained an enthusiastic and committed participator in Crosspool's summer fayres, festivals and street markets. Anne will be remembered for her commitment and relentless determination to make Crosspool a vibrant and attractive place to live, work, invest, visit and enjoy.

Whatever role Anne was asked to perform, she always gave it her all and did her very best for the people of Crosspool. She was greatly liked and respected and hugely committed to serving those whom she had the privilege of representing, whether in the community or within the Sheffield City Council.

During her time with the council, Anne sat on several cabinet committees and was one of the driving forces behind a successful campaign for one of the Royal Navy's eight new Type 26 frigates to be named after the city. She also tracked down the flag of HMS Sheffield, which is now proudly displayed in the Town Hall!

As chair of Sheffield Home of Football (SHOF) Group, Anne was an instrumental part of the drive for Sheffield to be recognised as the home of football. Anne once explained, "Football is more than just a game, the sport builds communities, encourages social cohesion, boosts

SCHOOLS CLIMATE ASSEMBLY - A CALL TO ACTION


On the 20th October, over 1400 students and over 45 schools from across the country met at King Edward VII School for the second ever Schools' Climate Assembly. Chris Packham's passionate words fell upon young ears as he tip-toed the fine line between the harsh reality of global rising temperatures and the hope and determination that young people must share in order to fight it. With him, Miriam Turner, CEO of Friends of the Earth; Scarlett Westbrook, noted for her work in climate and education policy;

Mikaela Loach, a climate justice activist; Megan McCubbin, a zoologist and wildlife TV presenter: Maxwell Ayamba, an environmental journalist; and Sile Sibanda, a spoken word performer and local radio host, shared their unique insight into climate change; the struggles they had endured, and the successes they had enjoyed. After listening to the speakers' words and engaging in workshops, it was clear to all the students who attended that climate change is real and could have unimaginable consequences, but it is a problem that can be solved.

Young people have the power to make real change.

The students then signed a banner that displayed our three demands, including immediate action, which four King Edward VII students, including myself, later delivered to the doorstep of 10 Downing Street.

Shabaz Khan, a Y10 student who also attended the trip to the House of Commons, had this to say about the Schools Climate Assembly: 'I gained a lot of knowledge from the Schools' Climate Assembly as they taught me



Our visit to Downing Street coincided with the start of the COP 27conference in Egypt. This means that we had a unique opportunity to make real change, and possibly influence the talks and decisions of world leaders at COP 27; a chance for young people to make an impact on a global scale. Following the Schools' Climate Assembly, we had three demands, composed in a letter, to take to Downing Street: 100% renewable energy by 2030; climate education across the curriculum, for everyone, and investment into jobs and apprenticeships that will tackle climate change. From here we hope that our demands will be considered by our Prime Minister, and possibly discussed at COP 27, allowing the young voices of the Schools' Climate Assembly and King Edward VII School to be heard.

On the trip to London, we were eager to represent the young voices of the Schools' Climate Assembly and we met with numerous politicians to discuss our demands and COP 27. We first met with Ed Miliband Shadow (NetZero and climate change minister), (Sheffield Hallam MP) Olivia Blake and Nadia Whittorne (youngest MP), enjoying a productive and inspiring conversation, in which the Labour politicians displayed their passion for this issue and a genuine interest in what we had to say.

It felt like a great privilege to get to speak with the likes of Ed Miliband who was very intense, yet friendly and compassionate, suggesting that he would take our letter of demands with him to the COP 27 conference. We finished our day meeting with Liberal Democrats Deputy Leader Daisy Cooper who reassured us that climate change was a top priority amongst many politicians, and that our frustration around climate inaction is shared by many in parliament.

David Ogah, a Y11 student who was interviewed by BBC Look North and attended the trip to Downing Street had this to say: "The event's purpose was to give a platform for the voices of us young people and to enlighten us about the severity of the climate emergency and what needs to be done by both the people and the government. Our visit to Downing Street was an extension of that as we were given the opportunity to let our demands be known and sent to our Prime minister and hopefully see changes via new laws that reflect our demands and aspirations.

The highlight of the day was certainly our visit to 10 Downing Street. The strict security and police, casually boasting automatic weapons, echoed the importance and magnitude of the situation as we nervously approached the infamous door to hand in our letter of demands. The door was impeccably shiny and, after handing our letter to the doorman, it dawned on us that although the fight against climate change may at times feel impossible, scary, hopeless and untouchable, it is not. This is a fight that is worth fighting, a problem that is worth solving and it is the collective effort of many, just like the huge number of students who met on the 20th of October at King Edward VII School, that will eventually save our planet.

The Plough public house has been demolished this week. The date stones have been

removed for safe keeping.

Precinct Christmas trees went up in early December and came down Sunday 8th January. These were then shredded along with those of local residents, to be recycled in due course. Donations received will cover costs etc.

 Children's Christmas party: this was very well received this year – Barney Baloney & Father Christmas doing their usual excellent roles!

· Wed. morning Tai chi class numbers are not yet back to their pre-pandemic levels - a Council grant is helping to keep this going. Tues, morning Easy Exercise now has good attendance.

Manchester Rd fatality after a road traffic incident on Jan.16 - Police are seeking any dashcam footage to help their investigations...

 Mobile speed camera enforcement update –
 61 notices of intention to prosecute issued in six months for speeding on (A57) Manchester Road near Den Bank Drive.

 Proposed imminent closure of the public collection office at Tapton Hill sorting office.
 There has been no prior consultation, a petition is going round to prevent its closure – the nearest P.O. collection office would be Pond St or Hillsborough.

 Data for speeding is "shocking" – 71% drivers on Manchester Rd over the 30mph speed limit, & 73% on Watt Lane.

· As there is a funding stream for friends of

parks groups Friends of Lydgate Green may be able to tap into this through the Crosspool Forum.

- Our SW LAC has funded a hand-held speed gun and is offering training for its use by the communities.
- King Edward's upper & lower schools have suddenly been deemed inadequate and placed in special measures. Local Councillors were eager for any parents objecting to this to contact them.
- A secret session meeting with Amey was not totally satisfactory. Amey do not have an adequate maintenance programme for issues such as zebra crossing repainting or filling potholes, which will only be addressed if reported (Allotment holders can no longer access the leaf litter to make leaf mould!) Cllr. Tim Huggan is trying to get further details on leaf clearance etc. – sometimes very slippery.

 The rotten and broken barrier at the Marsh Lane entrance leading to Clough Fields needs to be repaired/replaced. Cycles and motorbikes are now using this footpath. This is to

be chased up.

 Moratorium on the Ultra-Low Emission Zone ruling, requested by resident; workmen have not had the time to replace high emissions vans with compliant vans, saying the boundaries for the zone are "ridiculous".

It was noted that in a hilly city in bad winter weather there is not the luxury of going 'the long way round' to avoid an inner ULEZ zone, compounded by roads not being gritted etc.

 Clough Fields right of way; although Ruth had no up to date info. Roger Kite is attending a meeting on 25th February, at which he has been promised a definitive answer.

• Extended white H sign to help with the disabled attending Benty Lane Scout Hall. We are pushing for this.

 New public feedback initiative from the Police & Crime Commissioner – (southyorkshirepcc.gov.uk).

 Proposal to erect a memorial to Cllr. Anne Murphy in Crosspool – perhaps in Lydgate Green? **Events.** Pictures please for the 2024 calendar!

Thanks to the shops for selling this year's calendar. · Crosspool Festival (Fri 30th June to Sat 8th July). Theme for the well dressing not yet chosen (- possibly new monarchy?) Plans are well underway for the Street Market and Summer Fayre; stallholders are already booking.



THE ROCK PROJECT SHEFFIELD

The Rock Project is an after-school Rock School focusing on teaching children how to play their instruments or sing as part of a band. LET'S KEEP COLDWELL PARK LITTER-FREE

In the two and bit years that my family and I have lived in Crosspool we have found Coldwell Park & Sports Field a fantastic place to relax and have fun. It has a children's playground, plenty of space to play games and for dogs to run around, and there's even a tennis court. Not to mention the versatile sports hall.

It's a shame that often there's quite a bit of litter around the park & sports field. Most commonly sweet wrappers, crisp packets and plastic drinks bottles and sometimes glass beer bottles. This shame is greater considering children and animals use the park and sports field .

When glass bottles are among the litter, they sometimes get broken into pieces which are extremely dangerous. Sadly it seems glass is occasionally deliberately shattered. From time to time I find broken glass near the top of the large slide, which my young son loves to play on.

At worst, last summer I had to use a dustpan and brush to sweep up numerous small shards of glass all around the new climbing frame and slide that is within the fenced play area, regularly used by young children.

Rather than become bitter about incidents like this, I would prefer to hope that a change in attitudes could see everyone help to look after this local asset.

Coldwell Park & sports field belongs to Crosspool and District Youth Sports Trust (CDYST); hence it is not a site with bins emptied by Sheffield City Council.

Having contacted CDYST to seek how to address the litter problem, I understand that litter has been a continuous issue and they have attempted many solutions. In the past bins have been placed around the park only to be often ignored and sometimes vandalised.

I spoke to, Dave Bolsover, the CDYST Chair Trustee who said they are very appreciative to have goodwill of volunteer litter pickers (including my young son and me) alongside the CDYST cleaner and trustees that currently help to clear litter from the park and sports field .

As a community, let's work together to keep Coldwell Park and sports field a space to be proud of. I imagine the majority of park users don't drop litter (it's rare to find dog mess there). Let's encourage those who may be tempted to drop litter, not to do so (parents having a word with their youngsters if need be). Thank you.
