

#### THE FUTURE OF CARVER FIELDS

The Stephen Hill Methodist Church recently facilitated a community meeting to discuss the current and future use of Carver Fields The Sheffield Methodist Circuit is seeking a better understanding as to the role and potential of this cherished local asset. WELCOME TO CALVER FIELDS

The aim of the meeting was to create a transparent conversation about the site's future, considering the needs and costs involved. A wide invitation had been extended to ensure diverse community participation and gather a range of perspectives.

The outcome of the meeting was a number of proposals for submission to the Sheffield Methodist Circuit leadership that reflected a positive outlook for Carver Fields.

Proposed ideas included: development as a space for sustainable living, physical activity and social interaction. creation of a playground, sports field, and walking trails. Installation of permea-

ble pavements for better accessibility, ensuring that the site is accessible to all, including those with disabilities, promote inclusivity and a volunteer program for site maintenance and community events. This initiative highlights the significance of involving the community in decision making to ensure developments reflect local interests and values.

#### FLY-TIPPING FINES INCREASED

The recent statutory changes granting councils the authority to impose increased fines mark a pivotal moment in local governance. This shift empowers councils to enforce regulations more effectively, aiming to uphold community standards and deter regulatory infringements. The specific focus on combating fly-tipping and litter through steeper fines reflects a proactive approach to environmental stewardship. The decision by Sheffield City Council to adopt harsher penalties for such offences demonstrates a response to public concern, aligning with the broader intent to preserve the cleanliness and safety of public spaces. The anticipated revenue from these increased fines is expected to bolster enforcement services, thereby reinforcing the council's commitment to addressing these environmental challenges. This strategic move could serve as a model for other councils facing similar issues, by potentially leading to a nationwide enhancement of environmental policies and enforcement mechanisms. The new fines for fly tipping will rise to £1000 (up £600) and the penalty for littering is doubled to £160 (up £80). These new fines are expected to raise an additional £100k per year which will be channelled into enforcement services.

#### Treasurer's Report.

John Drinkwater said money had been coming in for street market pitches, Councill grants such as for the Cllr Anne Murphy memorial in Lydgate Green, etc, but also money being spent! The stone carver Stoneface has been paid a deposit for Anne's memorial, some folding tables bought, contributions to the Art Group for materials, and to Suzy Kerfoot (Aspects of Beauty) for her upcoming USA gymnastics competition. If the RVCG wants to propose a project as part of repairing the Rivelin Valley damage this can be looked at.

#### Police Report

PCSO Pam Thompson had hoped to send in a report but nothing has been received.

#### Councillors' Questions & Report -

LAC community plan receives its money in May and it starts being distributed in October - feed in any priorities you may have now.

Progress of Manchester Road crossing? It is very difficult to get lollipop men replaced, but Ruth was "slightly hopeful" that Crosspool would get a new crossing at the junction of Selborne Rd/Manchester Road. Even the "temporary battery operated" crossings cost £1k a week! & still need a lot of committee work & consultations.

The Council has a backlog of jobs which is accelerating faster than they can get done - and fewer officers.

Lost post boxes – knocked-down one on Manchester Rd, and now one on Moorbank has gone. Even the intervention of the MP has had little effect on getting the Post Office to respond!

Despite worries that postal ballots for the local Elections in May might not get through there is a swell of all boxes and sorting offices that evening to collect any late ones and ensure they are counted. (Individuals can drop their completed ballot papers in a Polling Booth – but only their own).

Hagg Copse is too small to show up on the Green Belt but can be listed as an open space for protection.

#### Update On Rivelin Valley: Storm Babet Oct.2023 Destruction

Sam Beaton (prow@sheffield.gov.uk) said damage had occurred from Wyming Brook down to Malin Bridge – big stepping stones totally washed away, weirs, fords, footbridges & paths. The continuing very wet weather meant although he visits weekly it has been very difficult to inspect the river bottoms & assess some of the work needed. They can only repair like-forlike – not widen existing paths to form cycle tracks or bridleways. They have funding to start with the stepping stones but need more manpower, and then move onto the weirs & fords. The Rivelin Valley Conservation Group have already started doing small repairs, and the Council is working with them. Other local groups could ask for funding - Heritage Lottery perhaps -or crowdfunding – as there is a £4m backlog of jobs across the city. Their first statutory priority is to get the paths that they had to close as unsafe repaired and open again.

Jude of Care in Crosspool then reminded everyone of the support her group gives to carers since 1988, visiting or taking them out and about – meaning that insurance and petrol etc. needs covering.



Look for any visible damage to your wheels and tyres Check for any vibrations while you're driving. Check if your steering wheel doesn't centre properly or if the car pulls to one side.

If you see any damage or the steering doesn't seem right, get your car checked by a garage or tyre specialist as soon as possible. It can be costly and dangerous to ignore tracking or steering damage. If your car has been damaged by a pothole, it's important to take immediate steps to document the incident, if you intend seeking compensation. Firstly, ensure your safety and the safety of others; if necessary, move your vehicle to a safe location. Document the damage to your car with clear photographs, and note the date and time of the incident. Also, take pictures of the pothole, including close-ups and wider shots to show its location. Measure the pothole, if possible, as this can be crucial evidence. Generally, a pothole needs to be at least 40mm deep to be classified as such,

Remember, the success of your claim may depend on the quality and thoroughness of the evidence you provide.

## COUNTRY ROAD SAFETY

By doing so, one not only safeguards themselves and others but also contributes to the serene and unspoiled nature that makes the countryside an enchanting place to drive.



## ART.2: INTEGRATE RATHER THAN SEGREGATE



In my previous article on permaculture, I tasked you with noticing the things you enjoy, and designing a setup that facilitated them. I enjoy flowing water, wildlife, and a lively, friendly precinct. One of many options to mutually facilitate these is to direct rainwater from shop gutters into trickling water features that feed planters that bloom flowers that attract wildlife, all of which makes for a pleasant walk among the flora, fauna, and friendly faces. This is classic permaculture: minimal

effort to kickstart events that self-support and grow opportunities. There's a lot going on in my example but it illustrates a core concept in permaculture: integrate rather than segregate. Our world of data and digital is heavily focused on progress through analysis. But did you know that "analyse" comes from a Greek word meaning to break apart? This can be useful to understand some things, but to implement new understanding, we need to put things back together, into context, and into practice.

Consider Crosspool's Piper's Artisan Sausages, who integrate the processing, flavouring, seasoning, cooking, and selling all under one roof. This ensures that Piper's and their customers know exactly what went into making the sausages, which facilitates trust, responsiveness, variety, and high-quality. As I said in the previous article: cultivating multiple benefits, mutually and simultaneously.

A task before the next Clarion is for you to notice when the effects, outputs, and odd bits of things find a use elsewhere, such that they are brought back into context.

Faced with inadequate facilities, the parents of the young footballers took matters into their own hands, demonstrating remarkable initiative and perseverance. Their efforts not only improved the conditions for their daughters but also revitalized a communal space, turning it into a hub of activity and celebration.

The story of Crosspool Juniors is an inspiring example of how collective action can overcome challenges and create lasting positive change, ensuring that the growing popularity of girls' football is matched by the quality of its infrastructure.

Girls' football has massively taken off in recent years – but facilities have not always developed with the sport's popularity, as the parents of Crosspool Juniors' Football Club came to realise when their daughters moved to bigger pitches in Myers Grove.

"There was a single toilet in the club house – and that didn't have a seat", remembers Hannah Wright, mum of Hollie (10) and Olivia (8), who both play for the club. Everything was covered by thick layers of dirt, spider webs and discarded old tyres.

"It was an absolute dump", says Hannah. She convinced other parents of the Under-11 team that there was only one way to deal with the problem: "We clearly had to do it ourselves." The parents started an ambitious renovation project to install a range of additional toilets, a new kitchen, give the rest of the house a good clean and clear up the overgrown outside.

Tom Smith (father of player Maisie) runs local building company Downing and Smith Developments and took over most of the building work: "We were overwhelmed by how helpful local businesses were and we managed to source a lot of free materials. Toilets, wash basins, gravel & timber were donated by local companies like Pagets, MKM, Timber Specialist, Plumbco, Hargraves and Dan @ Rivelin Plant Hire lent us a mini digger along with a dumper." A whole new kitchen was donated by Howdens which Neil goodwin installed.
